His fields of specialization are primarily macroeconomics, labour economics and public economics. He has advised various European governments and international organizations. He has published in numerous academic journals.

*** **Alessio Brown** (born August 30, 1975) is an economist from Germany. He is executive director of the Global Economic Symposium (GES) and head of the research area "Reforming the Welfare Society" at the Kiel Institute for the World Economy, Germany. His fields of specialization are macro-laboureconomics, employment incentives and employment policies.
